## Speaker Biographies

### **Ron Arias**

Ron Arias is the Director of the Department of Health and Human Services (DHHS) for the City of Long Beach. In this capacity Mr. Arias is responsible for an annual budget of over \$50 million and oversees six departmental bureaus which include: Public Health, Environmental Health, Animal Control, Preventive Health, Administrative Support Services and Physician Services. As DHHS Director he spearheaded the development of the Miller Family Health Education Center, which opened its doors in April of 2004. The Mission of the MFHEC is to provide a vital learning environment dedicated to promoting a healthy city through health education, leadership development and collaboration with our diverse community. At the heart of the MFHEC is the Multicultural Pavilion, a state of the art conference and training center with integrated language interpretation equipment similar to a mini-United Nations meeting room. Mr. Arias is a graduate of the University of Southern California with a Master's in Public Administration. He received his bachelor's degree in Kinesiology from California State University, Long Beach.

### **Jean Armbruster**

Jean Armbruster is currently the Director of the PLACE Program (Policies from Livable, Active Communities and Environments) at the Los Angeles County Department of Public Health. Launched in 2006, the program addresses the affects of the physical and social environment on residents' health. Ms. Armbruster received her undergraduate degree from Colorado College and her Master of Arts in Applied Anthropology from California State University, Long Beach. She has previously served as a Children's Health Analyst for the Children's Health Initiatives Unit at the Los Angeles County Maternal, Child, and Adolescent Health Program, where she worked to implement the Department's asthma goals and objectives.

### **Angelica Baltazar**

Angelica Baltazar is the Healthy Communities Program Coordinator for the County of San Bernardino Department of Public Health. Her role is to provide technical assistance to communities throughout the county giving specific recommendations for policy and environmental strategies to improve residents' health. She works in the various sectors of the community including local government, education, community organizations, faith based organizations, media, and health care in order to promote healthier lifestyles and access to health. Currently, the Healthy Communities Program has official partnerships with twelve cities which reach over half the residents of the County of San Bernardino. Ms. Baltazar holds a Bachelor of Social Work from California State Polytechnic University in Pomona and a Master of Social Work in Policy, Planning, and Administration from Loma Linda University.

### **Dede Benson**

Dede Benson has been with the City of Fontana for three years and was hired as the first Community Services Coordinator for the Healthy Fontana Program. Healthy Fontana quickly became an awarding winning community-based program designed to promote active living and smart choices in nutrition to the residents and employees, and encourages Smart Growth communities to developers in Fontana. Ms. Benson currently sits on the City's Development Advisory Board, where she gives input on new development that brings walkability and connectivity throughout the City. Her creativity and determination awarded the Healthy Fontana Program the California League of Cities, Helen Putman Award for Excellence in Health and Wellness for 2008. Ms. Benson is a graduate from the University of Maine at Farmington with a Bachelor of Arts in Business and Economics with a concentration in Sports Coaching and Management.

### **Rick Cole**

Rick Cole has been City Manager of Ventura since 2004. He was recently honored by Governing Magazine as one of their nine "2006 Public Officials of the Year," the only City Manager in the nation to earn that distinction. Mr. Cole has focused on four key priorities, the ABCS of Ventura government: Accountable government; Balanced budget, Civic Engagement and Smart Growth. Called "one of Southern California's most visionary planning thinkers" by the Los Angeles Times, he previously served six years as City Manager of Azusa, California. He brings an unusual background to city management, having previously served as the Southern California Director of the Local Government Commission, Mayor of Pasadena, Executive Director of the West Hollywood Marketing Corporation and co-founder of the Pasadena Weekly newspaper. Cole is widely cited as an urban policy expert and is a member of the Congress for New Urbanism, the Urban Land Institute and the International City/County Manager's Association.

### **Crispin Delgado**

Crispin Delgado joined the Health Policy and Planning staff of the San Mateo County Health System as a Management Analyst in November 2006. He is the project manager for the Healthier Outcomes through Multi-disciplinary Engagement (HOME) Team and the San Mateo County Projection Model, which seeks to project socio-demographic data for San Mateo County's older adult population. Previously, Mr. Delgado served as a Policy Analyst for an applied health policy research unit of the University of California, Office of the President. He received bachelor degrees from the University of California, Davis in International Relations and Spanish in 2000 and his Master's in Public Policy from the Goldman School of Public Policy in 2003 from the University of California, Berkeley.

### **Bill Fortmueller**

Bill Fortmueller has worked in the Park and Recreation profession for over 35 years. He is currently the Assistant Director of Recreation and Community Services for the City of Vista in north San Diego County where he oversees the Aquatics, Cultural Arts, Senior Services, Senior Nutrition, Recreation, Rancho Buena Vista Adobe divisions, capital improvement projects of the Department and the City's Public Arts program. Prior to his current position with the City, Bill served as the Parks and Building Superintendent for 15 years where he oversaw the construction of the Wave Water Park, renovation of the Avo Theater and the construction of 4 city parks. He was employed by the Mission Viejo Company as the Manager of Recreation for 12 years and the University of California at Irvine as Facility/Program Coordinator for 5 years. Mr. Fortmueller received his Bachelor of Arts degree in Humanities from the University of California at Irvine and a Master of Arts degree in Recreation Administration from California State University at Los Angeles.

### **Dorit Fromm**

Dorit Fromm writes and researches on design, community and aging. She has been researching nonprofit senior housing and services models in the Netherlands, Denmark, Germany, and Sweden. Ms. Fromm's writings have appeared in local, national and international publications and she is the author of *Cohousing, Central Living and Other New Forms of Housing*.

### **Eric Frykman**

Eric Frykman serves as the Health Officer of Riverside County and also directs the county's Community Health Agency. Dr. Frykman is involved in the development of local prevention and response plans for threats to the public's health. He enjoys questioning the status quo in a search for innovative solutions to public health's challenges. After completing medical training at Loma Linda University (LLU), Dr. Frykman pursued a residency in public health/preventive medicine at LLU Medical Center. He earned his MBA with an emphasis in Strategy from the Drucker School of Management. Dr. Frykman has also served or studied in multiple countries including Bangladesh, Mexico, Russia, and East Africa.

### **Rick Gould**

Richard E. Gould has been the City of Santa Clarita's Director of Parks, Recreation, and Community Services since March of 2001. He is focusing on park development, facility construction, and open space issues, as well as strategic planning to manage the projected growth of the Parks, Recreation, and Community Services Department. Cultural arts, special events, and partnerships have been a recent growth area. Mr. Gould has over 30 years of Parks and Recreation experience. Prior to Santa Clarita, he was the Community Services Manager for the City of Pleasanton. Mr. Gould received his Bachelor of Art's degree in Political Science and History from the University of Redlands. He earned a Masters degree in Public Administration from the University of Southern California.

### **Nicole Hara**

Nicole Hara is the California Healthy Cities and Communities (CHCC) Program Coordinator at the Center for Civic Partnerships. Ms. Hara has seven years of experience working in the health and public policy field. Previously, she worked as a Project Manager for the Center for Health Improvement. She has also worked for the California Office of Statewide Health Planning and Development; the Sacramento Area Council of Governments; and the U.S. House of Representatives. She received her Bachelor of Arts in Political Science from California Polytechnic State University, San Luis Obispo, and has a Master of Public Policy and Administration from California State University, Sacramento.

### **Huasha Liu**

Huasha Liu is the Director of the Department of Planning Methods, Assessment and Compliance at the Southern California Association of Governments (SCAG). Major programs under Ms. Liu's supervision include Data Management, GIS Applications, Integrated Land Use / Economic / Transportation Model Development, Regional Housing Needs Assessment, Advanced Analysis and Research, Transportation Modeling Application, and the State of the Region Report. She has over twenty years experience in transportation, regional planning and related fields. She also has substantial planning experience in Nanjing, China focusing on regional collaboration and public policy for economic development on the Pacific Rim. In 2004 Ms. Liu was appointed by the Los Angeles County Board of Supervisors to serve on the county's Quality and Productivity Commission. Ms. Liu earned her bachelor's degree in Urban and Regional Planning from Nanjing University and her Master's degree in Urban and Regional Planning with a specialization in transportation planning from the University of Southern California's School of Policy, Planning, and Development.

## Speaker Biographies

### **Dave Moore**

Dave Moore is one of two superintendents that manage the operations, personnel and facilities of a large and enterprising community services department in the City of Rancho Cucamonga. Mr. Moore has been responsible for assisting or taking the lead in the development and management of most of the department's joint use agreements. This includes the development of a number of partnerships with various school agencies, nonprofit agencies and private businesses to promote a more effective use of resources and enhance the number of services that can be offered to the community. This is an important goal of Rancho Cucamonga's Healthy RC program and has saved the City and its partners a great deal of money over the last several years.

### **Gerardo Mouet**

Gerardo Mouet was appointed as the Executive Director for the City of Santa Ana's Parks, Recreation, and Community Services Agency in August 2004. After getting his Bachelor of Arts degree in Political Science from the University of California, San Diego, he worked as a Fair Housing Counselor in Los Angeles and later accepted a position at the University of California, Irvine where he served as Assistant Director for the Educational Opportunity Program. Gerardo began working for the City of Santa Ana in 1990 and helped establish the City's Workforce Diversity Program and coordinated the City's Public Business Academy. Gerardo has focused in leading the Agency on accomplishing its mission in a team-oriented way. The purpose of the Agency is to provide quality programs and services that inspire fun, fitness, and respect through active living, community events, arts, culture, and exploration of the natural world. The Agency's motto is Learn \* Have Fun \* Get Fit \* Be Respectful. With an annual budget of \$16 million, the 300 employees in Santa Ana's Parks, Recreation, and Community Services Agency serve the largest city in Orange County and 9th largest city in the State of California with a population of 370,000. The Agency manages 40 parks, athletic fields, a network of trails, 19 Recreational facilities, such as recreation centers, senior centers, pools, libraries, a Stadium and a Zoo.

### **Katherine Aguilar Perez**

Katherine Aguilar Perez is the Executive Director of the Urban Land Institute, Los Angeles District Council. With her diverse background in private real estate development, governmental policy and urban planning, she has emerged as one of the most articulate and credible advocates promoting the responsible use of land. In 2007, Multi-Housing News selected Ms. Perez as an industry leader and one of the eight notable "People to Watch in Multi-Housing." She was accompanied by a highly acclaimed list of industry professionals chosen for their commitment to workforce housing, green building, and the principles of New Urbanism. Southern California based Business Life magazine also recognized her as an "Outstanding Leader." Ms. Perez was the co-founder and Executive Director of the Transportation and Land Use Collaborative (TLUC) of Southern California, a nationally recognized non-profit that promotes greater civic involvement in planning and development. Previously, she worked for Pasadena Mayor William Bogaard as the Deputy to the Mayor where she worked on transportation, planning and Latino constituents' issues. Ms. Perez is a frequent speaker at national, state and local conferences on issues pertaining to land use, development, transportation, community planning, and civic engagement. She received her Masters degree in Urban Planning and Transportation from UCLA and her Bachelors degree in Political Science from California State University, Northridge.

### **Mary Poole**

Mary Poole began her career with the City of Citrus Heights in October of 1998 and has steadily grown with the City. Ms. Poole is the lead for the City's Healthy Cities project and is now facilitating the creation of a "green" planning curriculum for residents to learn and apply sustainable, healthy "green" practices as individuals, households and as a community. She also holds responsibilities in contract and program administration, the Capital Improvement Program, traffic safety, walkability and accessibility outreach, and project implementation. Ms. Poole received her Bachelor of Arts in Criminology from the University of Minnesota, Duluth. She is now pursuing a Master's degree in public administration.

### **Clare Smith**

Clare Smith is a Research Associate with the Center for Civic Partnerships. Ms. Smith engages in research and development projects to produce new resources for municipal leaders and their partners on community-based planning for healthy aging. This work recognizes the importance of planning for potential challenges and promises of an aging California, by building and expanding on the successful Healthy Cities and Communities Program. Ms. Smith has over 20 years of experience in the planning, implementation, promotion and administration of statewide services and activities focusing on improving access to Medicare benefits, promoting the rights and protections of Medicare beneficiaries and their families, rural health care advocacy, community-based services for the aging, caregiver and long term care issues. Over the years, she has worked directly with a diverse array of community-based organizations, engaged in coalition-building and presented to various stakeholders (e.g., consumer advocates, general public, media representatives, government officials and legislative staff) on complex social, aging, health and public policy issues in California. Ms. Smith has a Bachelors degree in Psychology and a certificate in Applied Social Gerontology from San Jose State University and received a Master's degree in Gerontology from the University of Northern Colorado.

### **Tina Sray**

Tina Sray has worked in the parks and recreation profession for the last 28 years. Ms. Sray's professional career includes working as a park maintenance worker for the City of Palm Springs, park planning intern for the City of Anaheim and management assistant for the City of Redlands. Subsequently, she began her employment with the City of Chino, where she is currently employed as the Community Services Department Director. Ms. Sray is an active board member for Soroptimist International, California Parks and Recreation Society, American Red Cross, and the Chino Youth Boxing Foundation. She is the Parks Commissioner for the City of Redlands and the past president of the Rotary Club of Chino. Ms. Sray received her bachelor's degree in Park Administration from California State Polytechnic University, Pomona.

### **Marion Standish**

Marion Standish currently serves as Director at The California Endowment (TCE). She previously held the position of Program Director for The Endowment's Disparities in Health program, where she led the foundation's efforts to develop program initiatives that reduce health disparities. In that capacity Ms. Standish served as lead officer on many major funding initiatives, including Healthy Eating Active Communities; Community Action to Fight Asthma; and The Partnership for the Public's Health. She also designed TCE's partnership project with The Rockefeller Foundation, California Works for Better Health, a four year effort to build the capacity of community-based organizations to improve neighborhood health status through regional employment strategies. Ms. Standish also provides national philanthropic leadership in the development of foundation partnerships and serves as the convener for the Convergence Partnership which brings multiple funders together to pursue cross sector efforts to build healthy communities.

Ms. Standish serves on the board of directors of the Food Research and Action Center, the San Francisco Community Boards Program, and the Neighborhood Funders Group. She is also a certified charrette planner.

### **Jerry Van Leeuwen**

Jerry Van Leeuwen began work in Escondido in January 1987 as the Assistant Director of Community Services and was later promoted to Director of Community Services, with responsibility for senior citizen programs, housing, library and human services. Mr. Van Leeuwen also provided staff support for the Public Art Commission. During his work with Escondido, he has developed many programs specifically directed towards strengthening and revitalizing lower income areas. In addition, his department created and implemented programs such as community gardens, alcohol abuse prevention and community outreach. Some of these efforts have been recognized by California Healthy Cities and the League of California Cities. Mr. Van Leeuwen was the recipient of the Health Hero award from Palomar-Pomerado Health in 2003. A native Californian, Jerry graduated from Westmont College in Santa Barbara and received a Masters of Administration degree from the University of California, Riverside. 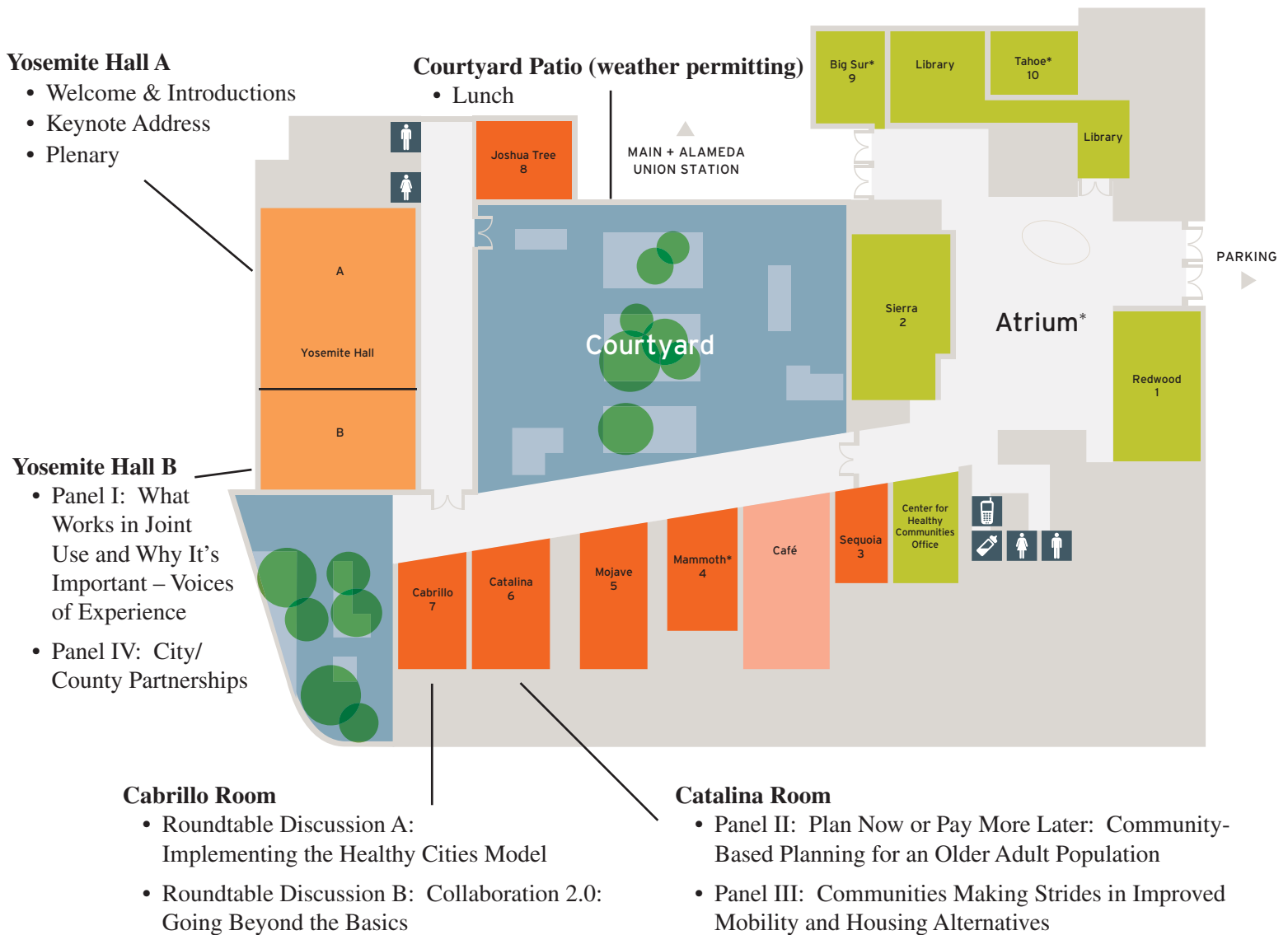
